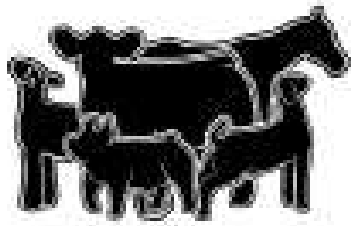

General Rules

1. Eligibility: Anyone from Roosevelt County and surrounding/reciprocating counties is eligible to display exhibits at the fair as “Public Open Class”. All members of Roosevelt County 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters are considered in-county.
2. Age Requirements: Age of the exhibitor must be on all entry blanks except school and adult entries. The minimum age for general exhibitors is 4 years old at the time of the fair.
3. All entry blanks must be postmarked or hand delivered to the FAIR OFFICE by July 15. Online entries close July 15 at 11:59 pm. LATE ENTRIES WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED! Entry tags may be picked up at the fairgrounds on August 3 & 4 between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. unless noted earlier on our Facebook page. Please watch for updates. Exhibit removal time is between 5:00-7:00 p.m. Friday, August 7 or between 8:00-noon Saturday. Premium money will NOT be awarded if exhibits are removed early, unless arrangements have been made with the Fair Office. Open Class premiums will not be paid out at fair. 4-H, FFA, Open Class, and Livestock Premiums may be paid out through advisors and Extension/Fair office at a later date.
4. All exhibits must be the exhibitor’s own work.
5. Exhibitors may enter as many entries as they desire. PREMIUMS WILL ONLY BE PAID ON ONE ENTRY PER LOT.
6. If premium payments total more than \$10,000, the Fair Board reserves the right to prorate payments, paying youth first then adults.
7. The Fair Board in consultation with Extension reserves the right to formulate and announce new rules to meet emergencies.
8. Roosevelt County, Roosevelt County Fair Board, and the Roosevelt County Extension Service are not responsible for damage and/or loss of equipment, items, or exhibits.
9. Ribbon premiums are \$6 for blue ribbon and \$4 for red ribbon. White ribbons will only receive premium dollars at the discretion of the superintendent and/or judges. 4-H Cloverbuds and grades K-3 will receive a \$3 participation prize
11. The decision of the judges will be final. No appeals will be considered.
12. Judges will not award prize money to unworthy exhibits.
13. Judge’s Choice & Champion ribbons will be awarded at the discretion of the Judge. Prizes will be awarded at the discretion of the Fair Board.

*****PARKING*****

For the safety of our exhibitors and fairgoers NO vehicles will be parked inside the grounds. Please park all vehicles and trailers outside of the fairgrounds perimeter chain link fence. If you need to bring feed or supplies in with your vehicle, please do so before 8am. Trailer parking will be along the east end fence near the Weed District Shop. No livestock or cargo trailers are to be parked within the camping areas.

EXHIBITING VEGETABLES AND FRUIT

Beans (Waxed or Green) – Uniform in size, shape, color and stage of maturity. Free from blemishes. Seeds about half-matured in the pod. Not stringy, should snap readily when bent. No broken ends.

Beets – Uniform in size, shape and color. Smooth and free from side roots and blemishes. Trim the top to 1" in length. Flesh should be firm, crisp, and fine-grained.

Broccoli – The bottom trimmed evenly and fresh. The head should be compact, dense, and free from insect or disease blemishes. Avoid heads with yellowing or florets beginning to open.

Cabbage – Head should be solid and dense. Remove only outer leaves that are diseased or damaged. Allow one or two of the dark green wrapper leaves to remain on the head. The stem should be evenly trimmed at the base of the last leaves left on the head.

Carrots – Avoid oversize. Type and color is important. Fresh, crisp, firm, smooth, clean and free from sunburn, side roots, cracks or other damage. Tops should be removed 1/2" to 1" from the crown.

Celery, Celeriac, Swiss Chard, Endive, Spinach – Remove the roots and underground portion of the stem but leave crown. Wash if needed. Keep cool and moist.

Corn, Sweet – Exhibits should be trimmed, fresh, green and tight husks. Loose husks should be removed. Do not clip the ear tip. Ears should be well-filled from tip to butt. Kernels should be well-filled.

Cucumbers – Harvest by cutting stems, leaving approximately 1/4 "of stem. Avoid injury to vegetable. Wash if necessary. Choose well-shaped specimens, those extremely pointed, dumbbells, and badly crooked are looked on as off type.

Dill, Parsley, Spinach – Remove the roots and underground portion of them, but leave the crown. Wash if needed. Keep in a moist cool place.

Kohlrabi – Remove roots, but leave above ground portions of the stem. Remove leaves, but avoid injury to the skin. Tenderness is important.

Lettuce, Head – Crisp, good color and firm. Remove damaged outside leaves. Medium-sized head. Trim the stem evenly at the base of the remaining outer leaves.

Lettuce, Leaf – Tender, good color, and fresh (not wilted). Cut off the stem at the crown or ground level (exhibit plant intact). Wash plant thoroughly and carefully to prevent damage to leaves.

Onions, Dry – Approximately two weeks before the fair, pull and twist tops and remove outer layers of dirty skin only. Spread them in an open shed so air will pass over them until time to take to the fair. Remove the tops and strip off roots, but in doing so avoid damage to the node or basal plate. Choose well-formed bulbs, avoiding "doubles", thick necks or other off type specimens.

Peas – Smooth, clean free from defects. Uniform, deep green pods well filled. Avoid over maturity as indicated by yellowing of the pods or tough or bitter peas.

Peppers, Sweet – Choose specimens that are firm or meaty. Leave approximately 1/2" of stem. Keep in a cool moist place. Avoid injury. Wash if necessary. If entering green peppers, then do not include ripe or even partially ripe (reddening specimens)

Potatoes – Immediately after digging tubers, allow them to set on the ground for approximately 20 minutes to allow the skin to “set”. Avoid rough handling or cuts, skinning and bruising. Wash gently. Select medium to large tubers, which are smooth and free of any defects.

Rhubarb – Stalks uniform in size and color. Fresh, brittle, solid, free from blemishes or dirt. Pull from plant, do not cut but remove small bracts at the base of each stalk. Leave ¼” of leaf on the stalk. Stalks may be tied in bunches or shown loose.

Rutabagas – Uniform with bright color, clean. Free from side roots and blemishes. Remove size roots.

Squash, Summer – Leave stem. Choose tender specimens. For the long type they may be 5” to 8” long. For the round type and crooked necks, choose those that are very tender and succulent. Some types are ready for use as soon as the blossom is withered.

Tomatoes, Green – Leave stems. Choose specimens that are not turning red. **Tomatoes, Ripe** – Remove stems. Avoid injury. Choose those free of cracking.

Zucchini – Should be 6” to 9” in length and waxy on the outside and have a rubbery feeling.

Apples – Fruits should be uniform in size. Apples should have a clear, intense color. Stems should be intact.

Currants – Fruit should be displayed in bunches (red, white and black) with the berries large, uniform in color and size, clean, bright, and firm. Bunches should be well-filled.

Chokecherries – Specimen should be ripe and free of blemishes.

Raspberries and Strawberries – Fruit should be sound and firm. Raspberries should be free of the stem while strawberries should have the stem attached.
